City Commission Regular Meeting Commission Chambers Tuesday, August 27, 2024 6:00 p.m.

CALL TO ORDER - The Governing Body met for a regular meeting and the following commission members were present in the commission chambers: Mayor Griff Martin, Mayor Pro-Tem Holly Pittman, Commissioners Nancy Bauder, Edd Hingula and Jermaine Wilson.

Staff members present: Interim City Manager Patrick Kitchens, Assistant City Manager Penny Holler, Finance Director Roberta Beier, Fire Chief Gary Birch, Planning & Community Development Director Julie Hurley, Community Center Manager Tammy Metzgar, City Attorney David E. Waters and City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner.

Mayor Martin asked everyone to stand for the pledge of allegiance followed by silent meditation.

OLD BUSINESS:

Consideration of Previous Meeting Minutes:

Commissioner Wilson moved to accept the minutes from the August 13, 2024 regular meeting. Commissioner Hingula seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Second Consideration Ordinances:

Second Consideration Ordinance No. 8248 Approval to Levy Special Assessments for Nuisance Abatement Costs – City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner reviewed the Ordinance. Since first consideration on August 13, 2024, 3 properties have submitted payment for the outstanding nuisance abatements and were removed from the Ordinance.

Mayor Martin called the roll and Ordinance No. 8248 was unanimously approved.

Public Comment: (Public comment on non-agenda items or receipt of petitions- limited to 2-3 minutes) David Bentley, 767 Ottawa St.:

Heard about the possibility of the pool and theatre closing and was present for information on that

Mike Collins, 504 High Ct.:

- Asked about the results of the budget survey
- Mentioned that residents are being asked to pay more taxes
- Mentioned the delinquent taxes published in the paper
- Asked if the City can cover the cost

Mary Bergman, 1801 2nd Ave.:

- Mentioned senior citizen taxes and taxes on those who are disabled
- Concerned about being taxed out of her home
- Asked about freezing taxes for senior citizens or cut them to less than the working class

Public Hearing:

Public Hearing Exceeding of the Revenue Neutral Rate:

Open Public Hearing:

Commissioner Bauder moved to open the public hearing. Commissioner Hingula seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Staff Presentation:

Interim City Manager Patrick Kitchens presented the City of Leavenworth's intent to exceed the Revenue Neutral Rate (RNR) which is required by Kansas Statute. As presented during the 2025 budget process, the City of Leavenworth's intent is for a flat mill levy, yet it will exceed the RNR as defined in the statute.

Citizen Comments:

None.

Close Public Hearing:

Commissioner Bauder moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Commissioner Wilson:

- Thanked the community for their feedback
- Many people reached out and didn't want services cut and were willing to pay a little more so the services could still be made available

Commissioner Bauder:

- We've had a lot of increases in expenses and not being able to increase the budget over the previous year doesn't make sense
- The survey results I read were that people didn't want anything to close or loss of services

Commissioner Pittman:

 Noted the State's budget is not revenue neutral and they mandated this down to other taxing entities

Commissioner Hingula:

- Spoke with the Finance Director and the amount of the increase is well worth all the services the city provides
- Stated that the increase for a home valued at \$250k would be \$5 increase for the year

Mayor Martin:

- Toughest decision I've had to make
- We're in a highly inflationary environment
- If you hold the line every year, you'll see services drop
- There is a fine balance of supporting residents with services

- Heard from people that they would pay more to keep services like the pool and theatre open
- Would like to see discussions on driving more revenues to the City to help ease the burden
- Would like to see the City hold the line and can't in good conscience vote to exceed revenue neutral

Consider Resolution B-2375 - Approval to Exceed Revenue Neutral Rate:

Commissioner Bauder moved to approve Resolution B-2375 – Approval to Exceed the Revenue Neutral Rate. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion. City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner called the roll for Resolution B-2375 for Approval to Exceed the Revenue Neutral Rate. Resolution B-2375 was approved with Mayor Martin voting No. Mayor Martin declared Resolution B-2375 approved 4-1.

Public Hearing on 2025 Operating and 2025-2029 Capital Budgets:

Open Public Hearing:

Commissioner Bauder moved to open the public hearing. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Adopt the 2025 Operating and Capital Budgets:

Commissioner Bauder moved to adopt the 2025 Operating and 2025-2029 Capital Budgets as presented. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was approved with Mayor Martin voting No. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 4-1.

Consider Resolution B-2376 – Approval of 2025 Housing Budget for Planters II:

Commissioner Bauder moved to approve Resolution B-2376 approval of the 2025 Housing Budget for Planters II. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

General Items:

Consider Transient Merchant Permit Waiver Request for Police Collectors Show at Riverfront Community Center — City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner presented for consideration an application for a waiver requested by Ken LaMaster for the use of the Riverfront Community Center on April 25 and 26, 2025 for a Police Collectors Show. The collectables show will be a fundraiser for the Leavenworth Prison Historical Society. City Code prohibits Transient Merchant permits on city property, but does allow the Commission to grant waivers. All fees for use of the facility and permits would still apply should the waiver be granted.

Commissioner Pittman:

· Very much in favor of this event

Commissioner Hingula moved to grant the waiver of a Transient Merchant Permit for use of the Community Center for the Police Collectors Show on April 25 and 26, 2025. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Mr. LaMaster:

- Started the Leavenworth County Prison Historical Society to highlight the prisons in the areas
- Known as the Prison Historian and this town has a rich history in Law Enforcement
- Appreciate the approval for the collectors show

Resolutions:

Resolution B-2377 Summer Concert Series and Moonlight Market Special Event Street Closure for Possession & Consumption of Alcohol - City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner presented for consideration a resolution allowing for closure of a portion of Cherokee Street for the Leavenworth Main Street Summer Concert Series and Moonlight Market special event on Saturday, September 14, 2024 to allow for the sale, possession and consumption of alcoholic liquor.

Commissioner Pitman:

Asked how notifications go out and who they go out to for a road closure

Ms. Bodensteiner:

• Notification goes to the property owner, we've attempted to mail to the address that is directly impacted, but they are not always successful in delivery and are returned as undeliverable

Mr. Kitchens:

 Provided insight to the Police Departments practices when it comes to notifications with road closures

Ms. Shaw:

- Provided details about the event
- 3 bands, 30 craft vendors, potentially 10 food trucks

Commissioner Pittman moved to approve Resolution B-2377 for the Leavenworth Main Street Summer Concert Series and Moonlight Market Special Event as presented. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

Bids, Contracts and Agreements:

Replacement Project – Fire Chief Gary Birch presented for consideration rescinding the award of the bid for the HVAC Replacement Project with D'Agostino Mechanical Contractors Inc. During the July 23, 2024 meeting, the Commission approved a recommendation to award the Fire Station No. 1 HVAC Replacement Project to D'Agostino Mechanical Contractors Inc. in the amount of \$87,950.00. Less than one week after the City Commission's approval to award the bid to D'Agostino Mechanical Contractors Inc., staff received notification that they have made an error with their pricing for the project and would not be able to do the project for that price. Staff requested an unofficial update to the cost and the updated cost was \$20,287.00 higher than the original bid. Based on the large increase in the updated cost from the original bid, staff is recommending the award of bid be rescinded, and allow staff to re-evaluate the project and rebid the project.

Mayor Martin:

· Asked how many bids did we receive

Chief Birch:

Only 1 was received; we feel confident we'll get more bids this next go round

Commissioner Wilson moved to rescind the award of bid of the Fire Station No. 1 HVAC Replacement Project and the additional option of replacing the air handler from D'Agostino Mechanical Contractors, Inc., 4440 Oliver Street, Kansas City, KS. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Martin declared the motion carried 5-0.

First Consideration Ordinances:

First Consideration Ordinance Rezoning Certain Properties at 2nd Avenue & Santa Fe Street from RM-F to R1-6 - Planning & Community Development Director Julie Hurley presented for consideration an ordinance to rezone the 15 properties located at approximately 2nd Avenue & Santa Fe Street from Residential Multi Family to High Density Single Family Residential District. In recent years, the City of Leavenworth has received multiple rezoning and special use permit requests for properties occupied by existing nonconforming uses. Typically, these requests originate from the intention of the property owner to sell or expand the existing non-conforming use on the property, which necessitates bringing the property into conformance with existing development standards. It has been the general desire of the Planning Commission and city staff to facilitate these applications in instances where no action of the property owner has caused the property to become non-conforming. Staff has identified an area suitable for a cityinitiated rezoning. State statute grants authority to municipalities to initiate a rezoning process for privately owned properties. The identified area consists of an existing neighborhood containing 15 individual properties all developed with single-family homes, which is currently zoned RM-F, Residential Multi Family. The area lies east of 2nd Avenue, roughly between Santa Fe and Sheridan Streets. The RM-F zoning designation makes all of the existing single family homes non-conforming, as single-family homes are not allowed either by-right or with approval of an SUP in the RM-F zoning district. Staff proposes to rezone the properties within the identified area to R1-6, High Density Single Family Residential District, which will bring all properties included into conformance with current development standards. The Planning Commission took action on this item at their August 5, 2024 meeting and voted 4-0 to recommend

approval of the rezoning request. Ms. Hurley reviewed the Conditions of Determination that were referenced in the Policy Report.

Commissioner Pittman:

 Received a few calls from some of the property owners but once it was explained to them they were all happy and fine with the process

Ms. Hurley:

- We understand that a letter stating the City is rezoning your property is concerning and we
 anticipated calls and once we spoke with people and talked to those who came to the meeting
 everyone was good with the process
- This also does not impact their property taxes, as taxing is not based on zoning

There was consensus by the Commission to place the ordinance on first consideration.

BACKGROUND:

At the August 27, 2024 City Commission regular meeting the City Commission reviewed and placed on first consideration:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, APPENDIX A OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS BY REZONING CERTAIN PROPERTIES IN THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS FROM MULTIPLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT (RM-F) TO HIGH DENSITY SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT (R1-6).

ORDINANCE NO. 8249

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, APPENDIX A OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS BY REZONING CERTAIN PROPERTIES IN THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS FROM MULTIPLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT (RM-F) TO HIGH DENSITY SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT (R1-6).

WHEREAS, under the Development Regulations, Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, the Governing Body of the City of Leavenworth is given the power to amend, supplement or change existing zoning regulations within said City; and

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission, after fully complying with the requirements of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, held a public hearing on the 5th day of August 2024 in the Commission Room, 1st Floor of City Hall, 100 N. 5th Street, Leavenworth, Kansas. The official date and time set as was published in the Leavenworth Times newspaper on the 11th day of July 2024 and notice of the public hearing was mailed to all property owners as required by K.S.A. 12-757(b); and

WHEREAS, upon a motion made, duly seconded, and passed, the Planning Commission adopted findings of fact and recommended approval of the request Rezoning certain properties in the city of Leavenworth Kansas from Multiple Family Residential District (RM-F) to High Density Single Family Residential District (R1-6); and

WHEREAS, upon a roll call vote duly passed, the Governing Body adopted the findings of fact and conclusions to rezone the property described herein.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1: That the following described properties, to-wit, are hereby rezoned from Multiple Family Residential District (RM-F) to High Density Single Family Residential District (R1-6).

Lots 25, 26, 27 and 28, Block 1, CHERRY HILL SUBIDIVSION, City of Leavenworth, Leavenworth County, Kansas. And more commonly referred to as 535 Santa Fe Street, Leavenworth, Kansas

ISSUE:

Conduct a Public Hearing regarding the unsafe or dangerous structure located at 3851 Tonganoxie Drive.

BACKGROUND:

On July 23, 2024, the City Commission was presented a resolution regarding setting a date for a public hearing related to the structure located at 3851 Tonganoxie Drive that was damaged by fire. The Commission approved Resolution No. B-2373, setting September 10, 2024 as the date for a public hearing for the purposes of Chapter 20, Article V, of the City Code of Ordinances.

The structure was damaged by fire on May 24, 2024. City staff has spoken with the owner and contractor, and a building permit application has been received for this project. The contractor intends to make repairs to the occupied portion of the structure first. Those repairs should be completed by the end of 2024. The garage portion of the structure will be completed after the occupied portion is completed.

When structures are damaged by fire and the damage is severe enough that the settlement from the insurance company exceeds 75% of the face value of the policy covering the structure, the insurance company is required to draft a payment to the City of Leavenworth for 15% of the settlement. This money is to be used to either remove the structure if the owner decides not to repair it, or return the property to the owner once repairs have progressed to a reasonable point, which is when the exterior has been repaired and the interior is ready for wall finishes to be installed.

The City has received proceeds from the insurance company for this property for \$44,696.40. The money will be returned to the property owner once repairs have progressed to a reasonable point or are completed and the structure is ready for occupancy.

NOTIFICATION PROCEDURES:

On July 29, 2024, a copy of said resolution was mailed by certified, restricted delivery mail to the owner and lienholder. The City Clerk published the resolution on the dates stated in the resolution.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the owner/contractor be given 90 days to begin the repairs to the structure. Staff will provide an update after the 90 days.

COMMISSION ACTION:

The Commission is asked to approve Resolution No. B-2378 giving the owners 90 days to begin repairs or start the demolition process, or another amount of time decided by the Commission.

WHEREAS, the Governing Body did adopt Resolution No. B-2373 fixing the time and place of a hearing at which the owner, their agents, any lienholders of record, and occupants of such structures could appear and show cause why such structure should not be condemned and ordered repaired or demolished and providing for giving notice thereof as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. B-2373 was published in the official City newspaper on July 27, 2024 and August 3, 2024, and a copy of said Resolution was mailed and served on the owner, agents and/or lienholder of record of such structure as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, on September 10, 2024 the Governing Body heard all evidence submitted by the Chief Building Inspector of the City and heard any evidence submitted by the owner, agents, or lienholders of records.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1. That the Governing Body hereby finds that the fire damaged property described above is an unsafe and dangerous structure. The owner of the structure is hereby directed to commence repair or removal of such structure on or before that date listed in Section 2, and if such owner fails to commence such repair or removal within the time stated or fails to diligently prosecute the same until the work is complete, said Governing Body shall cause the structure to be razed and removed and the cost of such razing and removing, less salvage, if any, will be assessed as a special assessment against the lot or parcel of land upon which the structure is located as provided by law.

Section 2. The property is hereby given 90-days for repair or removal at which time the City Commission will review at the next scheduled meeting.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that the City Clerk and/or Chief Building Inspector shall cause this Resolution to be published once in the official City newspaper and a copy mailed to the owner, agents, and/or lienholder of record, and occupants or served personally as provided by law.

Last year, Kristi Lee, CVB, and I met Lt. Governor David Toland and Bridgette Jobe, Director of Tourism Kansas in Topeka. At the meeting Lt. Governor Toland pledged a \$47,500 matching grant for the feasibility and conceptual drawings for the new museum project at Fort Leavenworth.

In follow-up communications with Mr. Brett Sayre, Business Development Finance Manager, Kansas Department of Commerce, he said "Lt. Governor Toland would like to help support this project through the State's Job Creation Fund (JCF) in the amount of \$47,500. These JCF funds are contingent upon the Frontier Army Museum securing matching funds from local government and are to be used to support the expenses related to the conceptual drawings and feasibility study."

As was outlined at the July 23rd Leavenworth City Commission meeting, these funds are critical to obtaining the tools needed to make our fundraising campaign effective. It is thereby our request that the Commission approve the \$47,500 match to satisfy the grant made by Lt. Governor Toland.

Employee Benefit Plan Renewal September 10, 2024

<u>ISSUE</u>: Review and approve the recommendation for employee benefit coverages to be effective December 1, 2024.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends renewal with current providers for medical, dental and vision for the new plan year beginning December 1, 2024. Current providers are: United HealthCare for medical and vision coverage and Delta Dental for dental coverage.

BACKGROUND: The City has maintained employee medical coverage through United HealthCare since December 1, 2005. UHC continues to demonstrate their ability to provide a long-term strategic partnership in health care with the City.

The final renewal bid from UHC, with no plan design changes, came in at a 9.9% premium increase. This renewal reflected well below the manual experience rating calculations for our group. However, UHC did take into account our improved experience rating and usage trends over this past year. Unfortunately, our overall experience rating over the last 12 months still exceeds 100%, which is much improved from the 200+% rating last year. Based on the quote received last year when we bid out the medical coverage along with the City's current usage rating at over 100%, a market search was not conducted.

The final renewal from Delta for 2025 came in with a 5% premium increase and no plan design changes. With this year's renewal, we were also provided a 2-year rate guarantee, which will mean a flat renewal for next year.

The final renewal from UHC Vision for 2025 came in with a 5% premium increase and no plan design changes. The vision also received another three year rate guarantee which provides for the same level of benefits with no premium increase for two additional years.

Based on the above information, Staff is recommending the City renew with UHC for both medical and vision coverages and renew with Delta Dental for dental coverage, with no plan design changes to any of the plans.

If the Commission approves the Staff recommendations, the renewal date for the medical, dental and vision plans would be December 1, 2024.

This would require employee enrollment for medical, dental and/or vision coverage only for those employees interested in electing coverage, changing plan levels and/or adding/dropping dependents from coverage.

Open enrollment informational meetings for employees and retirees will be scheduled for the weeks of October 7 & 14. Open enrollment meetings will be held at the Community Center with multiple dates and times to choose from. Our benefit providers, UHC, Delta and Aflac will be on-site to provide information and answer individual questions from employees. A rep from KPERS Optional Group Life Insurance will also be present this year along with our plan representative from Mission Square retirement. In addition, we will have limited community business partners on-site this year, such as Commerce Bank, Frontier Community Credit Union, etc. for most of the open enrollment meetings. HR staff will be available at each open enrollment meeting to answer questions or provide additional information if needed.

<u>BUDGET IMPACT</u>: UHC is providing a 9.9% increase for medical and 5% increase for vision and Delta Dental is providing a 5% increase to the current rates. Dental and vision renewals for coverage came in on budget for 2025; however, the medical renewal came in above budget. Finance Director, Roberta Beier, has identified funding mechanisms for the budget shortage to meet the 9.9% renewal increase.

ISSUE:

The Fire Department is requesting approval to move forward with the HVAC replacement at Fire Station No. 2.

BACKGROUND:

Fire Station No. 2 is 23 years old and is currently utilizing the original air conditioning system. This system has reached the end of its projected useful life. Over the last several years repairs have become more frequent and costly.

The new HVAC system will utilize more efficient equipment and be easier and more cost efficient to maintain.

The City published an RFP on July 17, 2024 for the HVAC system replacement project with a due date of August 6, 2024 at 5pm. We received two bids for the project.



ISSUE:

Consider accepting donation of two vacant lots at 110 N 10th Street.

BACKGROUND:

The owners of two vacant lots at 110 N 10th Street, Ellis and Barbara Myracle, contacted the City with an offer to transfer ownership of the lots at no cost. The lots are adjacent to a City-owned lot and across the street from Fire Station 2. Maintenance work on the lots had become more difficult and the owners wanted to eliminate that work. The lots were also nearly unbuildable as one goes directly over Three Mile Creek and the other is in the FEMA identified flood plain. Selling the unbuildable lots to a private party would be unlikely. The combined 2024 tax value according to Leavenworth County records is \$720. City ownership of the lots would allow for future stormwater projects to be conducted there and would eliminate any access or other issues with private ownership.



The City utilized a title company to verify that there were no encumbrances on the land that would interfere with future plans. The parcel numbers are 052-077-26-0-34-08-001 and 052-077-26-0-34-08-002. A records search found delinquent Leavenworth County taxes that the City will need to pay if the donation is accepted, currently estimated at \$27.27, along with additional City-assessed stormwater fees. Staff believes this is an acceptable cost to obtain these lots.

ACTION:

Staff recommends accepting donation of two vacant lots at 110 N 10th Street and approving the mayor and/or staff to sign documents transferring ownership to the City.

Policy Report No. 6-2024 51st Edition of Standard Traffic Ordinance September 10, 2024

ISSUE:

The Police Department is requesting the commission place an ordinance on first consideration that adopts the 51st Edition of the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities for use by the City of Leavenworth.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval.

BACKGROUND:

Every year the League of Kansas Municipalities produces a Standard Traffic Code for cities in Kansas. It is designed to provide a comprehensive traffic code and the City of Leavenworth has used it for many years. It does not take effect in a city until the governing body has passed and published an ordinance incorporating it as prescribed in Kansas Statutes.

The Changes are listed below:

Section 201.1 Failure to Comply with a Traffic Citation

Section 201.2 Failure to Comply with a Traffic Citation

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no budget impact.

COMMISSION ACTION:

Place an ordinance on first consideration that adopts the 51st Edition of the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities for use by the City of Leavenworth.

ORDINANCE NO. XXXX

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 44 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES REGULATING TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS; INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCES FOR KANSAS CITIES" 51st EDITION, WITH CERTAIN OMISSIONS AND CHANGES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1. INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE. That the Code of Ordinances, City of Leavenworth, Kansas, Chapter 44, Traffic and Vehicles, Section 44-1, is hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44-1. Incorporating Standard Traffic Ordinances.

- (a) Adoption. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 51st Edition, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts, or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified, or changed.
- (b) Marked copies on file. One official copy of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. XXXX" with all sections and portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of Ordinance No. XXXX, and filed with the city clerk, to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable business hours. The police department, municipal judge, and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of official copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked, as may be deemed expedient.
- (c) Omissions, changes, additions, and deletions to the standard traffic ordinances for Kansas Cities.

Article 11. Pedestrians. Section 69(d) relating to pedestrians soliciting is hereby omitted and deleted.

<u>Article 14. Miscellaneous Rules. Section 114.5</u> relating to Work-Site Utility Vehicles is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 114.5. Unlawful Operation of a Work-Site Utility Vehicle.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a work-site utility vehicle:
 - (1) On any interstate highway, federal highway, or state highway; or

- (2) Within the corporate limits of any city unless authorized by such city.
- (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles may be operated to cross a federal highway or state highway.
- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a)(1), persons engaged in agricultural purposes may operate a work-site utility vehicle on a federal highway or state highway under the following conditions:
 - (1) The operator of the all-terrain vehicle must be a licensed driver and be operating within the restrictions of the operator's license;
 - (2) The federal highway or state highway must have a posted speed limit of 65 miles per hour or less;
 - (3) The operator of the all-terrain vehicle must operate the all-terrain vehicle as near to the right side of the roadway as practicable, except when making or preparing to make a left turn; and
 - (4) The purpose of the trip using the all-terrain vehicle must be for agricultural purposes.
- (d) No work-site utility vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, or road between sunset and sunrise unless equipped with lights as required by law for motorcycles. (K.S.A. 8-15,109)
- (e) As provided by subsection (a) (2), it shall be unlawful to operate a worksite utility vehicle except for public safety and city maintenance staff within the corporate limits of the city.
- Article 15. Operation of Bicycles, Motorized Bicycles, and Play Vehicles. Section 135.1 is amended to read as follows:
 - Sec. 135.1. Electric-Assisted Scooters, Traffic Law Application.
 - (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate an electric-assisted scooter on any interstate highway, federal highway or state highway.
 - (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), traffic regulations applicable to bicycles, Sections 127 to 133, inclusive, shall be applicable to electric-assisted scooters.
 - (c) The governing body of a city or county may adopt an ordinance or resolution that further restricts or prohibits the operation of electric-assisted scooters on any public highway, street or sidewalk within such city or county.
 - (d) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (c), the provisions of subsection (a) shall not prohibit an electric-assisted scooter from crossing a federal or state highway. (K.S.A. 8-15,113)
 - (e) As provided in subsection (c), it is unlawful to operate or for the owner to permit the operation of an electric-assisted scooter upon a street, highway, public parking lot, or public parks area.

Section 2. REPEAL. Section 44-1 of Chapter 44, Traffic and Vehicles, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, in existence as of and prior to the adoption of this ordinance and all other ordinances that are in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

ISSUE:

The Police Department is requesting the commission place an ordinance on first consideration that adopts the 2024 Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities for use by the City of Leavenworth.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval.

BACKGROUND:

Every year the League of Kansas Municipalities produces a Uniform Public Offense Code for cities in Kansas. It is designed to provide a comprehensive public offense ordinance and the City of Leavenworth has used it for many years. It does not take effect in a city until the governing body has passed and published an ordinance incorporating it as prescribed in Kansas Statutes.

The following changes are amended:

Sec. 9.1	Disorderly Conduct
Sec. 9.9.1	Unlawful Possession of Marijuana and Tetrahydrocannabinols
Sec. 9.9.2	Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and Certain Drug Precursors
Sec. 9.9.4	Unlawful Possession of Controlled Substances

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 30 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES REGULATING PUBLIC OFFENSES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS; INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES" 40th EDITION, WITH CERTAIN OMISSIONS AND CHANGES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1. INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE. That the Code of Ordinances, City of Leavenworth, Kansas, Chapter 30, Offenses, Sections 30-1, are hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

Chapter 30. Offenses. Sec. 30-1. Incorporating Uniform Public Offense Code.

- (a) Adoption. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Leavenworth that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities," 40th Edition, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts, or portions as are hereinafter omitted, deleted, modified, or changed.
- (b) *Marked Copies on File.* One official copy of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. XXXX" with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of Ordinance No. XXXX and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.
- (c) Omissions, changes, additions, and deletions to the Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities.
 - Article 3. Offenses Against Persons. Section 3.2.1, Sexual Battery, is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted.
 - Article 4. Sex Offenses. Section 4.1, Lewd, Lascivious Behavior, is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted.
 - Article 4. Sex Offenses. Section 4.3, Selling Sexual Relations, is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted.
 - Article 4. Sex Offenses. Section 4.5, Buying Sexual Relations, is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted.
 - Article 10. Offenses Against Public Safety. Section 10.6, Air Gun, Air Riffle, Bow and Arrow, Slingshot, BB Gun, or Paintball Gun, is hereby omitted and deleted. (See Section 30-3, Air guns, air riffles, bow and arrows, slingshots and BB guns of the Code of Ordinances, City of Leavenworth, Kansas.)

Article 11. Offenses Against Public Morals. Section 11.15, Permitting a Dangerous Animal to be at Large, is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted. (See Chapter 8, Animals, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Leavenworth, Kansas.)

Section 2. REPEAL. Section 30-1 of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, in existence as of and prior to the adoption of this ordinance and all other ordinances that are in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.
